The County Fair of Yesteryear

When I was a youngster 5 years old, I accompanied Mamma to the Cimarron County Fair in Boise City, OK, our hometown. That would have been the late 1920's. It seemed to my young mind that much of our farm & ranch was moving into town for the fair time of several days!!

Papa and my brothers had brought in livestock of horses and cattle., and had spent a great deal of time caring for their every need as they would be showing the best of the best. They also would be showing grains and other produce such as a garden produce that had proven to be well adapted to this area.

Mamma and I as her helper, placed her fancy handwork and other products in their rightful department in the first south fair building. This is the part of the fair I'll be closest to as this is where Mamma's things will be. Also, upstairs in this building are school displays from all the county schools, carefully and neatly arranged. So many, many sheets of writing by each student. Ruth (Aunt Babe) was quite interested in all this. The school children were given a day (Friday) off from school to go to the fair. The school displays were not judged as fair products. Caregiver's Corner

Staying hydrated year round is critical to the well-being of all of us, with life-threatening consequences for older adults. So unless your doctor has restricted your fluid intake, consider some helpful tips below:

- Eat foods high in water content, like fruits and veggies
- Have water available at all times. Recommended 48-64 oz/day
- With illness, try sucking on ice chips or eating popsicles
- Avoid alcohol and caffeine because they act as diuretics in the body and increase water loss
- Increase fluids with fever, diarrhea, nausea, and vomiting

If you avoid fluids due to possible embarrassing bladder control issues, remember:

- Make frequent restroom visits—good exercise, too
- Consider adult pull-ups or pads & change when they get wet
- Staying home for fear of embarrassment leads to isolation


