

1-2-3 APPLE DUMPLINGS

One of our Grief Share groups gathered recently for a fellowship and Shelley made these EASY & DELICIOUS dumplings that I'm sure you'll want to make for someone special, too!

Preheat oven to 350.

2 <u>Granny Smith apples</u> (peeled, cored, and quartered) 2 refrigerated <u>crescent roll dough</u>

Completely wrap dough around each apple slice, beginning with small end. Place apples slices inside a greased 9x13 pan.

Mix Topping Together and put a dollop on top of each dumpling:

1 Stick butter (softened, but NOT melted) 1 C. Brown Sugar, 1 t. Cinnamon

Pour 8 oz. of a **Sprite or 7-up** around the edges of the pan.

Bake 40 minutes and enjoy the aroma and delicious flavor with friends and family. Serve with ice cream!
