It's recorded there were well over 200 letters to Nellie on the pillow, and Coach Wooden slept next to them on his side of the bed, on top of the sheets covered only with the same bedspread they shared as a couple. Being a deeply religious man, Coach Wooden's love for his beloved Nellie not only made a lasting memory on his heart, but an everlasting comfort for his soul that he would see her again in heaven.

Mamma said that her sister, Nellie, was in charge of the kitchen and making meals. Grandmother had put her in charge so she could take care of her tailor trade. She and her mother before her were tailors, and they specialized in men's suits. They were in demand as there were few clothing stores in this new land.

As a youngster, I was always intrigued by the big red barn that stored prairie hay. My cousins who lived in the neighborhood were really good at negotiating the hay hooks upstairs as the took hold of the big hay hooks and happily swung to the ground floor amid laughter and glee. They were good sports as they allowed me to take part in the hayloft rides, and ah, what fun!! I don't imagine our parents were aware of this activity.

Some 50 years later I was telling Mamma about these rides with the older Bedwell cousins. She was agast! She said grandfather would never allow any children up in the hayloft. Only grown men who were working in the hayloft could even go up there. She added, "I reckon it all goes to prove that the hayloft was not hazardous to the health of the Bedwell children after all. However, it would still be well to thank the good Lord for his gracious protection of the innocent children!"

Christine and Marty spoke at the *Bentley Senior Center* in January and heard some great advice to pass along to you, or someone you love, who is grieving the recent loss of a loved one.

- "Listen, listen, listen." Meaningful touch, like holding someone's hand as they cry. No words are needed. Let them talk.
- "Just do it" was another suggestion, instead of saying "Let me know if there's anything I can do for you."

 There are 20-30 secondary losses a spouse experiences, so find some ways you can help meet those needs, even without being asked. Visits or phone calls are also more personal than texts or emails during this time.
- Hold your tongue on "It's time to move forward," or "They're better off now." Though this may be true, it seldom brings comfort at a time when they are missing their loved one and having an "ambush moment."
