The All-time Greatest Coach

The All-time Greatest Coach in my Eyes is John Wooden. He finished strong and positively influenced young athletes about life off the court as well as on the court. His legacy of discipline still lives on in the hearts of those who knew him or studied his philosophy for success, which was: "Success is peace of mind which is a direct result of self-satisfaction in knowing you made the effort to become the best you are capable of becoming."

Whether teaching the team to tie their tennis shoes or sticking to his facial hair rules, he earned respect for his principles because they served a higher purpose. As a cosmetologist, one of my favorite stories had to do with the hair. In the off-season, the boys would grow their hair out, along with a mustache and sideburns, but when the first practice of the season rolled around, it was clean shaven and 2" or less on the hair length. Until...

It was time for inspection as they started another season. Bill Walton had won player of the year and their team went undefeated with a National Championship. When Coach shook his head in disapproval on his hair, brave Bill Walton told Coach Wooden that he didn't have the right to tell him how to wear his hair. Coach Wooden calmly responded, "You're right. I don't have that right. I just have the right to determine who's going to play and we're going to miss you. And in about 15 minutes, I'm not going to have you unless you go upstairs and get that taken care of right away." To hear Bill's response on this 2:19 minute video is a classic. He got on his bike and rode down to the barber and told him to just cut it off. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4OPu3fnbmvo Coach Wooden taught them the respect of representing the university, not just themselves in this discipline.

Later, Bill Walton was quoted for sharing other disciplines he learned from his coach:

Coach Wooden never talked about winning and losing, but rather about the *effort to win*. He rarely talked about basketball, but generally *about life*. He never talked about strategy, statistics or plays, but rather about *people and character*. Coach Wooden never tired of telling us that once you *become a good person*, then you have a chance of becoming a good basketball player.'

All three of our kids have played sports throughout school and college, along with club ball in the off-season. We have had numerous coaches over the past 19 years. A handful of have made a positive impact on our kids. I have reminded them they can also learn how NOT to coach from the sour lemons. Now our son is part of a collegiate coaching staff and I can see our girls coaching at some level when they finish their collegiate careers. I believe we can ALL positively "coach" those in our sphere of influence and inspire lives for generations to come.

<u>FUNNY STORY</u>: In the world of baseball, in 1976 Lou Piniella came to spring training with long hair and protested, saying, "I don't understand, Mr. Steinbrenner, what long hair has to do with your ability to play baseball," Piniella said. "I'm a Christian. Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ had hair down to the middle of his back, and it didn't affect the way he went about his work." As a friend or a spouse, David learned the value of listening, respecting, and loving the person by showing them that you haven't given up on them, and you haven't walked away. Bombard them with more small touches and send small emails to let them know how much they are on your mind.
